Dana Bennett is President of the Nevada Mining Association, the trade organization for Nevada's original STEM industry. Before joining the Association in 2014, she served as the Northern Nevada Regional Director for the Governor's Office of Economic Development. After earning a BA and MA in history, she began her policy career by working for the Nevada Legislature for nearly a decade where she staffed committees concerned with state and local government operations, technology in education, health care, and public lands. Between her tenures in the legislative and executive branches, she spent several years in the private sector, operating a policy research business and employed as a legislative advocate with clients in mining, educational innovation, broadcasting, and insurance, among others. With an abiding curiosity about Nevada's history, Dana took a break in her career to earn a PhD in history. Her dissertation explored the intersection between women legislators and tax policy development in Nevada before 1960. Dana has authored three books (one of which was designated a Sesquicentennial Legacy Project) and more than 50 articles, reports, and other publications. She currently serves on the Nevada Board of Economic Development, the Advisory Council for the Kenny Guinn Center for Policy Priorities, the Advisory Board for WGU-Nevada, and the Board of Trustees for the Western States Arts Federation. Dana and her husband, Shannon Jackson, now live in Reno.

MONTE CRISTO FIELD TRIP OCTOBER 10-13

This is a nice area we have not hunted for a couple of years. We will gather Agate, Jasper, Rhyolite and some petrified wood. In one area there is some nice seam agate with pseudomorphs and/or sagenite inclusions. They are pretty colorful rocks with lines. The camping area is located 2.5 miles from Hwy 6 and is a nice flat area. To reach the camping area go South on Hwy 95 to Coaldale junction, Hwy 95 joins Hwy 6. Proceed East toward Tonopah proceed about 6 milesto Blair junction (Hwy 6 & Hwy 265). I stop there and let all traffic pass. Proceed East 4/10 of a mile and turn left on a hard to see dirt road. If pulling a rig I recommend turning a little early and take the turn at a angle. When DOT redid Hwy 6 they did not cut a very good turn off. After turning go 2.5 miles toward hills camp will be on right side. On Thursday afternoon there will be RGMS signs out on Hwy 6 at the turn.

We will leave camp at 8 am each morning. On Saturday the 12th we will have a potluck at 6pm. Any high clearance vehicle will get to the collecting sites. Since we are collecting rocks, we will be in rocky area that have snakes. Dress for rock hounding—no sandals. Bring tools and if you wish breaker bars and hard rock tools. To get the good seam agate may require hard work. But, there is a lot of great surface material.

I will be out of town the month of September. Any questions ask around, a lot of members have been there. You can also call or e-mail me in October.

ing! All official information regarding scheduling and class details is published in *The Conglomerate*. Register and pay for classes at the general meeting. We accept cash or check made out to RGMS!

Children may register for classes only at the discretion of the teacher. Wear protective shoes or boots to work in the shop-NO open toe shoes, sandals or slippers. Please Note: To register for classes you must either be a member or have \$1 million of liability insurance naming RGMS as the certificate holder. If you are not a member, unless you present a valid insurance certificate at registration, you must wait until the next general meeting after you join to register for classes. Your insurance is included in the membership fee.

BE NICE! Each class using headquarters is responsible for leaving the premises clean and tidy. Any tools belonging to RGMS should be put away securely and headquarters locked.

MONDAY OPEN HOUSE

Make your own projects! You must take at least 2 months of lapidary classes before you will be cleared to attend open house and must have your name on file as approved to work on your own in the shop. Speak to the lapidary instructors to be added to the list. Please be sure to follow shop safety rules. At 8:45 please start clean-up so chaperones can go home. Supervised by Daniel Ellis. Shop fee \$5/hour. Monday, October 7, 14, 21, 28 7-9pm. Closed 9/3

BEADING AND STRINGING

Beading in 2019 will be offered quarterly on a **Saturday** morning. Next class will be offered October 26, from 10-2. Class is taught by **Sue Webb.** \$2.50/hour payable at class or the meeting.

CASTING

Casting is currently on hiatus until an experienced instructor is found. When offered and weather permitting, casting is taught in two classes held on Friday evenings. Classes enroll a maximum of 4-6 students. Sign ups will be taken at the general meeting when classes resume.

LAPIDARY

Lapidary is limited to 4 new students, but a daytime class is now available. For shop safety, an absolute limit of eight people may work in the shop at one time. First time students must attend a one-time shop safety seminar (10/8) on the Tuesday following the general meeting at 10:30 am or 6:30 pm. Drop-ins are welcome on a first come, first served basis. Registered and pre-paid students always take precedence over drop-ins. Materials for your first two projects are included in your class fee. Evening class taught by Lloyd Raymond & Barbara Hartman, 7-9 pm; daytime class taught by Barbara Hartman and Julie Hilsabeck. 11am -1pm, Tuesdays, October 8, 15, 22, 29, 10/1. \$5/hr.

SILVER FABRICATION

In September no silver fabrication classes are available, but members may attend Thursday open house to complete projects.. When offered, classes are structured classes. The first two projects are specifically designed to teach you the fundamentals of silver fabrication (making jewelry). Therefore, you will not be able to do other projects until you complete the two projects. RGMS provides tools to use on your first two projects. There is a \$20-\$25 fee for the silver which we provide for the first project. Stones are not included; however, we do have some for sale. For these two projects, only oval stones will be used. Suggested size for the first project is 18 x 13mm, and 30 x 32 mm for the second project. The stone size does not have to be the exact size but should be very close. You can purchase silver from the instructors for the second project, or you can use our own. Upon completion of the two projects, if you wish to continue, you will need your own basic set of tools. The tools that RGMS provides are for new students only. Before purchasing any tools, talk with your instructors. Instructors: Jay Logue, Jill Atkins and Al Bolshazy. Open House—no classes Thursdays October 3,10, 17, 24. 6- 9 pm. \$5 per hr.. No class 10/31.

WIRE ART

Drop in to work with wire the second and fourth Monday. Classes vary by the month, so check at the general meeting to see what will be offered for April. Brass wire only and tools available to lend in class to new students. Taught by **Jennifer Rhodes** and **Sami Ellis**. Monday, October 14, 28. 7-9 PM \$2.50/hour (\$5/class), payable in class.

HARD STONE CARVING

This class will be offered Saturday and Sunday, from 9 to 4 both days. Taught by award-winner and master carver **Josephine Snead**. Total cost for the class is \$70 (\$5/hour shop time). Children 12+ are welcome. Supplies list available at sign up. October 19 & 20, 9-4 both days. Bring food & drinks..
