The team consisting of **Sven Sanders, Rachel Carrol**, and **Steve Norman** went to Anderson, Westergard, Huffaker, Spanish Springs and Mt. Rose Elementary Schools. Sven taught the children about the many ways quartz is used in our modern world and has some great rhyolite samples for the student to observe. Rachel showed the children many fossils including shark teeth and a megalodon adult tooth which is huge. Steve Norman provides information on common minerals used in homes and schools. Each child receives a gift, so if anyone has some material that is colorful or materials that can be tumbled as a donation, I have my tumbler running.

<u>MINERAL OF THE MONTH</u> <u>RED QUARTZ</u>




Red Quartz (SiO₂) is crystologically the same as regular quartz, but a thin layer of hematite near the surface causes the red color. Sometimes it is iridescent. Depending upon the impurities included, quartz can come in many colors:

violet produces Amethyst, orange results in citrine, and rock crystal lacks impurities and is clear. Varieties also produce pink, green, brown, and black crystals. Two varieties are macrocrystalline which produces large crystals, and cryptocrystalline varieties of quartz which produce agates and jaspers in all colors of the rainbow. Further, turquoise is a silicate with 5 or 6 water atoms in the molecule.

With a vitreous luster, quartz has a hardness of 7 on the Mohs scale, and a specific gravity of 2.65-2.66. Its crystal system is trigonal. Quartz in its many varieties has been valued for over two thousand years. It is abundant in all forms of rock—igneous, metamorphic, and sedimentary. Industrial uses include providing silicon for glassmaking, frequency standards, and optical instruments. It is a silica source for concrete setting, and when constituted as sand, acts as filtering agents. Quartz is a major component of sand..

Children may register for classes only at the discretion of the teacher. Wear protective shoes or boots to work in the shop–NO open toe shoes, sandals or slippers. Please Note: To register for classes you must either be a member or have \$1 million of liability insurance naming RGMS as the certificate holder. If you are not a member, unless you present a valid insurance certificate at registration, you must wait until the next general meeting after you join to register for classes. Your insurance is included in the membership fee.

BE NICE! Each class using headquarters is responsible for leaving the premises clean and tidy. Any tools belonging to RGMS should be put away securely and headquarters locked.

MONDAY OPEN HOUSE

Make your own projects! You must take at least 2 months of lapidary classes before you will be cleared to attend open house and must have your name on file as approved to work on your own in the shop. Speak to the lapidary instructors to be added to the list. Please be sure to follow shop safety rules. At 8:45 please start clean-up so chaperones can go home. Supervised by Daniel Ellis. 6-9 PM Shop fee \$5/hour.

BEADING AND BEAD WEAVING

Must sign up. Beading in 2020 may be offered quarterly on a **Saturday** from 10-2. Next class will be offered in April. Class is taught by **Sue Webb.** \$2.50/hour payable at class or the meeting.

CASTING

Casting is currently on hiatus until an experienced instructor is found. When offered and weather permitting, casting is taught in two classes held on Friday evenings. Classes enroll a maximum of 4-6 students. Sign ups will be taken at the general meeting when classes resume.

KNOTTING AND STRINGING

Learn to string natural stones and beads beading wire, use silk for knotting pearls and craft wire for wire linking as well as stretchy for bracelets. The different tools involved in each project as well as different gauges of craft wire will be explained. You will be supplied with all you need to make bracelets. \$20.00 material fee. First and third Mondays, 7-9 PM. \$5 course fee. Taught by Laura Jackson

LAPIDARY

Must sign up. Lapidary is limited to 4 new students, but a daytime class is now available. For shop safety, an absolute limit of eight people may work in the shop at one time. First time students *must* attend a one-time shop safety seminar (11/12) on the Tuesday following the general meeting at 10:30 am or 6:30 pm. Drop-ins are welcome on a first come, first served basis. Registered and pre-paid students always take precedence over drop-ins. Materials for your first two projects are included in your class fee. Evening class taught by Lloyd Raymond & Barbara Hartman, 7-9 pm; daytime class taught by Barbara Hartman and Julie Hilsabeck. 11am -1pm, Tuesdays, \$5/hr.

SILVER FABRICATION

Must sign up. Beginning classes are structured classes. The first two projects are specifically designed to teach you the fundamentals of silver fabrication (making jewelry). Therefore, you will not be able to do other projects until you complete the two projects. RGMS provides tools to use on your first two projects. There is a \$20-\$25 fee for the silver which we provide for the first project. Stones are not included; however, we do have some for sale. For these two projects, only oval stones will be used. Suggested size for the first project is 18 x 13mm, and 30 x 32 mm for the second project. The stone size does not have to be the exact size but should be very close. You can purchase silver from the instructors for the second project, or you can use our own. Upon completion of the two projects, if you wish to continue, you will need your own basic set of tools. The tools that RGMS provides are for new students only. Before purchasing any tools, talk with your instructors. Instructors: Jay Logue, Jill Atkins and Al Bolshazy.

WIRE ART

Drop in to work with wire the second and fourth Monday. Classes vary by the month, so check at the general meeting to see what will be offered for April. Brass wire only and tools available to lend in class to new students. Taught by **Jennifer Rhodes** and **Sami Ellis**. 2nd and 4th Monday, .6-8 PM \$2.50/hour (\$5/class), payable in class.

<u>NAS FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX MODERNIZATION</u> <u>FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT</u> Summary by Al Bolshazy, RGMS ALAA representative

On January 26, 2020, the representatives from NAS Fallon presented their final environmental impact study (EIS) to a crowd of over 200 people. Capt. Evan Morrison is the Commanding Officer of NAS Fallon. Alex Stone is the EIS program manager of the US Pacific Fleet. I want to provide one website that has all the detailed information about the expansion of NAS Fallon: ._____

I will give you an overview of the meeting and keep it as brief as possible. I know a lot of this will not make sense but if you go to the above website it will give you a clearer understanding of this gigantic land grab. If I were to go into much more detail, this summary would be hundreds of pages long. The initial environmental impact study was composed of two volumes comprising approximately 3000 pages. Now, they have reduced it down to a pamphlet of 30 pages.

There were approximately a dozen representatives, each standing by various pictures and maps of the areas the Navy wants which totals over 600,000 plus acres. Each representative could talk only about their specific map or pictures, and it seemed as if they had a "canned" speech about their area. They were very nice but very unresponsive to questions outside of their specific area.

Mr. Stone was the main speaker. He talked as though Congress has already approved their request. He talked about how the government intends to close off all of these areas to the public. (From Dixie Valley to a couple miles north of Gabbs, Nevada); how they intend to close off areas to the Native Americans' sacred sites. Oh yes, he did say they would escort the Native Americans to their sites once a year for a few hours. In my opinion, this is outrageous! What about our treaties with Native Americans giving them access to their native lands?

He talked about how they responded to our concerns and made some adjustments to one of the major areas (B 16). This is the area that extends down towards Gabbs Nevada. He then went on to talk about the 15 areas of potential environmental impact mitigation.

- 1. Geological resources
- 3. Mining and mineral resources
- 5. Transportation
- 7. Noise
- 9. Water resources
- 11.Cultural resources
- 13. Social economics
- 15. Environmental justice

- 2. Land use
- 4. Livestock grazing

While listening to Mr. Stone talk about each one of these areas of mitigation, my understanding of his overall answer was "We're Gonna"! "We're Gonna" find an answer to that problem later. When talking about noise mitigation one resident of Gabbs, NV said, "they fly over my house so close I can see their faces. Just think, if they do that now what will it be like when they're just a couple miles from my home?"

When asked questions by the audience, the answer was "We're Gonna" work on that but we don't know how yet. I got the distinct feeling that once approved by Congress the solution will just go away. To me it felt like there was very little effort made to find the proper solutions to questions on mitigation issues as the answer was "We're Gonna".

Closing off thousands of acres to not only our Nevada citizens, but also those from every other State who visit Nevada. This area is popular for recreation, off road vehicle activities, collecting minerals found nowhere else in the world,, camping, hunting, etc. Also the area is important when looking for essential minerals for our national security as this is a highly mineralized area.

Of the 15 areas of mitigation, I heard no solution to the problems, just "We're Gonna". To find an answer and have a positive solution is something that should be done before any approval is given by Congress. I doubt we will hear anything more about solutions once this is approved by Congress!

There is another solution to this land grab. Why can't the Navy cooperate with the Air Force and use their 2.2 million acres of military training area and share this training range? The Navy would keep what they have now saving millions and millions of dollars from the taxpayers to convert the land to a training area. That was suggested at this meeting but fell on deaf ears. In my opinion, this is the best solution. Our military is our military comprising of all branches not just one.

Now we have the final EIS report. To them this is a done deal. But wait; we do have a recourse. If all of us were to contact our representative in Congress and our Senators and express our opposition to this excessive land grab, request they deny their request, perhaps some solutions will be found. This is our only viable course of action. Our own Nevada Legislature has approved two resolutions opposing this land grab.

So please, write, email, call your representatives, your Senators, even the President of the United States and object to this takeover. With this takeover my personal opinion is that the state of Nevada will become a military state, and we the citizens of this state will be confined to our cities and no longer be able to enjoy our backcountry.

So please go to the website and take a look. This will give you a better under-

OFF HIGHWAY VEHICLE

Synopsis by Al Bolshazy, RGMS ALAA Representative

To learn more about Off Highway Vehicle registration go to this site: <u>OHV.NV.GOV</u> This site will give you all the information you need to know about registering your off road vehicle. Here is a synopsis of the information.

Off Highway registration is very straight forward.

1. Obtain the registration form from the above site or from the Department of Motor Vehicles.

2). Take the completed form to an Official Off Highway Vehicle dealership or any Sworn law enforcement Officer. They will verify the VIN number. Note: The DMV office will NOT verify the VIN number.

3). The registration is done by mail only. You can send a check or money order to the Department of Motor Vehicles or take it to the Authorized Off Highway Vehicle dealership and they will finish the registration for you for about \$2.00.

The fee structure is listed on the above site and ranges between \$21.00 to about \$44.00 or so. If you are mailing your registration form in, send it to::

Where can you ride your OHV? On the site above click on the Trial Maps and it will show you several sites where you can ride your vehicle. If you are riding in an area controlled by the BLM, check with the BLM office that controls that area. Normally it is not a problem.

In conclusion, do the following to register your Off Highway Vehicle and where to ride:

- 1). Download the registration form and fill out
- 2). Have the VIN verified.
- 3). Send in your completed form or take it to an authorized dealership.
- 4). Check the OHV site and find out where you can ride and or check with the BLM office in the area you want to ride.
- 5). Most important: WEAR YOUR SAFETY EQUIPMENT!!!!!
