We have already had two field trips—to Wonderstone Mountain and Texas Springs. If you missed those trips, we have several more already planned or in the works. For me, there has always been a thrill that comes with discovering interesting crystals and other specimens in their natural state—in the ground, so field trip time is always my favorite time of the year.

New field trippers could benefit by checking that article so they can be safe and prepared for the collecting "level" they are comfortable with. They also often ask "What should I collect?" and while pictures or specimen samples at our clubhouse often give guidance on the most common finds, the final answer really is "whatever you find interesting."

What people find interesting can vary quite a bit! For some it is anything with nice color or crystals. For glow-hounds, crystals are optional if the sample fluoresces brightly enough under the UV lamp. For the hard-core hunter, most are searching for that beautiful and rare display piece. Others are just in search for the artistic yard rock.

Whatever your taste might be, if you like collecting outdoors, then join us on a fieldtrip.
